The students worked very hard this year in their Family/Consumer Science and Graphics/Photography classes, and four won ribbons! Andrew won Best in Show for his Cherry Pound Cake, Scott won Best in Show for his Banana Nut Bread and Romeo won first place for his Tropical Jelly Roll. James won a second place ribbon for his outstanding photography.

In late-August, 11 of our youth participated in the 2nd Annual Art and Glass Week at Salem Community College. Students were taught by world-renowned glass artist and SCC's Artist-in-Residence Paul Stankard, SCC's Scientific Glass Instructional Chair Dennis Briening and SCC's Glass Center Coordinator Doug Ohm. During a week of oppressively hot weather, the youth toughed it out to create one-of-a-kind glass art pieces in the flameworking and hot glass studios. They ended the week by creating a cast-glass tile which encased their flameworked objects. This collaborative art project will be placed at Ranch Hope to commemorate the students' accomplishments during Art and Glass Week. ## **Message From The Chief Executive** Officer Dave Bailey Jr.

In early October, I received a voice mail message from a mother of a former youth who had visited Ranch Hope in 1993. When I returned her call, she shared that her son had always thought of Ranch Hope as a second home. While his entire experience was positive, he especially remembered the equine program and the Belgian draft horses that participated in parades. Unfortunately, she also shared that her son's life had been taken just before Easter in 2003 and the case remains unsolved.

This mother's heart remains broken, and she continues to grieve some thirteen years later with no closure or answers for what happened and why. I cannot imagine the range of emotions she experiences on a daily basis, nor was I able to immediately heal her of this anguish over the phone. But, I am so thankful to play a role in a ministry that continues to serve this family, this mother. Why did she call the Ranch on this particular day? Pictures and memories of her son in his youth brought her back to Ranch Hope and the positive relationships and changes she saw in her son's life. I also believe that it was the Holy Spirit that lead

her to make this call, one in which I was able to pray with and for her and to encourage her to connect with a local church family. If you attend a church in the Atco, New Jersey area, and would be willing to connect and minister to her. I ask that you please reach out to me via dbailey@ranchhope.org.

You may have noticed that earlier in this message I stated that the young man had "visited" Ranch Hope back in the early 1990s. I chose "visited" because youth are just that—visitors to Ranch Hope. Each day you partner with us to provide them with high-quality, life-changing services so that Ranch Hope can better partner with their families when they return home. Our goal after each youth returns home is to assist each family with continued therapeutic services, reintegration into their school district, job placement, and prayerfully, a local church community.

The reality though, is that there are moments such as this one, where the Ranch's role is to be a listener, comforter and encourager to a family member we haven't seen in almost fourteen years; to a mother who is seeking loving friends at a very difficult time.

## **Taste and see .... a Ranch Hope staff member shares his faith**

In Ruth 2:9, Boaz (the Christ figure) promises to provide Ruth with food, water and safety. The promise hinges on Ruth's ability to follow one important instruction: Boaz tells her she must stay in his field and follow his workers doing his work. Ruth obeys and finds enough food daily from gleaning in Boaz's field. We read in Ruth 2:16 that Boaz informs His workers to "purposely pull out for her some grain from the bundles and leave it that she may glean, and do not rebuke her." Because of Boaz's loving-kindness, Ruth, a poor Moabite woman, was able to harvest enough to fill both her and her widowed mother-in-law's stomachs, and still have much left over. In addition, she receives protection from the perverse people that "did what was right in their own eves" during the time of the Judges (see Judges 19). Ruth was a humble woman who trusted Boaz and stayed in his field, and Boaz's provision allowed her to thrive.

As a servant in the Ranch Hope ministry, I have experienced God's hand building buildings and rebuilding boys. By the power of Christ in me. I have had hope in hopeless situations. I have eaten of God's fruit even when it was out of season. Like a fresh iersey tomato in February. God's provision is not limited by the cold months. To see His fruits in our lives, like Ruth, we must add obedience to our faith.

I urge you to determine in your heart to stay in His field no matter what the cost. Remember to seek first His Kingdom and the rest shall be added unto you. Choose this day to stay in His field. Subject yourself to His Kingdom. Be amazed as He prepares a table before you in the

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
RANCH HOPE MOURNS THE LOSS OF
